Shoemaker Green Named for Phi Phi Alum Public Space to Commemorate Al Shoemaker's Vision to Connect Campus to the City

In recognition of their longtime service and support of the University of Pennsylvania, **Alvin V. Shoemaker '60** and his wife Sally were honored on October 30th by President Amy Gutmann and Board of Trustees President Jim Riepe with the surprise announcement of Shoemaker Green, a welcoming new public space at the University. As a forecourt to the historic Palestra and Hutchinson Gymnasium and flanked to the south by Franklin Field and its new Weiss Pavilion, Shoemaker Green will provide a quiet respite and social gathering space on 33rd Street.

Twenty-five years ago, as president of the Trustees, Al envisioned the University's eastern expansion and began discussions with the U.S. Postal Service to one day acquire their property. Almost three decades later, the University's award-winning master plan, Penn Connects, called for a new public green in front of the Palestra, as a link to the new postal acquisition recently announced. Shoemaker Green will always commemorate Al's vision and dedication to create this new connection and expansion of the campus to the city.

The announcement was made as part of a stunning dinner celebration, held on the floor of the Palestra. On hand to celebrate with Al and Sally were over 300 family, friends and colleagues, including four Penn Presidents. As Trustee Chair and now Emeritus Trustee, Al

was fortunate to work with Presidents Sheldon Hackney, Claire Fagin, Judith Rodin and Amy Gutmann. His leadership in supporting women's

"I Must Attribute a Good Portion of [My Success] to My Undergraduate Fraternity Experience"

Judge James Gardner Colins '68 was Inspired to Join Sigma Chi by Witnessing the Fraternal Bond that Brought Together Vastly Different People

A judge of 28 years and today a part of one of the world's leading law firms, Judge **James Gardner Colins '68** got his start as a brother of Sigma Chi.

"I must attribute a good portion of what limited success I have achieved to my undergraduate fraternity experience," he said. "The experience of listening to the viewpoints of others at our chapter meetings and reaching collegial decisions in a cordial fashion served me well during my ten years as President Judge of Commonwealth Court."

Following in the footsteps of a father who graduated from Harvard, there was a certain amount of pressure for James to attend an Ivy League School. Having grown up in Philadelphia, the University of Pennsylvania seemed like the perfect choice.

"I fell in love with Penn from the first time I saw it," he said. "Oddly enough, this was when my father took me to Franklin Field to see the last Penn/Penn State football game at which Penn was slaughtered. Despite this, the school left a very positive and lasting impression on me."

Ten years later, James was recruited from Northeast High School to play football for Penn. "It was a very exciting and rewarding time and I was very enthusiastic at the prospect of attending what was then one of America's finest universities and is now America's finest university," he said.

Although James had no real familiarity with the Greek system upon his arrival as a freshman, he enjoyed his first meeting with the rush chairman. He says the deal was sealed when late in the fall of his freshman year, then presidential candidate Barry Goldwater gave a speech with a special greeting to his Sigma Chi brothers in the audience.

"I was so impressed that there was this bond between individuals of vastly different generations from vastly different parts of the country, solely created though their fraternal experience," said James.


James lived in the fraternity house sophomore and junior year with roommate, the late **Michael Cavanagh '68**, and formed close friendships with many people. "My classmates **Tom Farrell '68, Frank Tracy '68** and I are still quite close and I look forward to bumping into **Tom Cassel '68, Gene Castellano '68** and **Gordon McLaren '68**." James says that the list of names goes on and on and when he sees his undergraduate fraternity brothers ten, 20, or even 35 years later, it is almost as if time really has not passed and the bonds of friendship are instantaneously renewed.

Among the various social events and charities involved in fraternity life, James and his brothers raised money for the Wallace Village Project and enjoyed the annual "Sweetheart Ball" and black tie dinner dance.

Keeping him even busier, James majored in history as an undergraduate. "Unfortunately I think I had too much fun and should have spent more time with my studies," James says. "That is one reason why I have been so strongly impressed with the chapter's outstanding grade point average throughout the most recent decade." James obviously worked just as hard as the current brothers to earn himself a spot in law school after graduation.

Law school was a grueling process for James, but after he completed school he earned a prestigious job as an Assistant District Attorney, working for now United States Senator Arlen Specter. "District Attorney Specter was a great boss, and ran a good office," he said. "During this time, I would often think about how great it would be to become a judge." After this, Pennsylvania Governor Dick Thornburgh appointed him to a vacancy on the Philadelphia Municipal Court. "Present Pennsylvania Governor Ed Rendell had been an undergraduate friend at Penn, and was instrumental in recommending me to the Merit Selection Commission," James said. "I was later elected to a full term. "

Three years later, James made the decision to seek one of the three vacancies that had opened up on the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania and received one of the three Democratic nominations. "After several recounts, the results of the April primary were finally made official in September," he said.

"Luckily, I was the leading vote getter on the Democratic ticket in the November election. I worked incredibly hard for this, and I received the backing and support of many of my fraternity brothers from Penn, as well as from other Sigma Chi chapters."

After 28 years as a judge, James decided it was time for a change. "Mindful of Robert Frost's great poem, 'The Road Not Taken,' I decided that it was time to do something different, and reentered the world of private law practice."



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HOMECOMING 2008


