## **A Brotherly Bond**

Two Sigma Chi Brothers Searching for a Family at Penn Find One in Each Other

'54 never had any siblings of his own, so when he came to Penn as a freshman, he was looking for friends who would fill a similar role. When he joined Sigma Chi, he formed a brotherly bond with Fergus Sloan '54, who didn't have any siblings either. "Suddenly, we had many new brothers and were able to share and learn from our new 'families'," Norman said.

Norman remembers Sigma Chi house as a place to get away. He said, "The campus was not truly a campus because Philadelphia city trolleys cut through it. The house itself was an oasis in a city environment, a place for discussion and fellowship."

During their time as Sigma Chis, Norman and Fergus developed a strong relationship, and they created many great memories together.

In 1952, over the Christmas holiday, Fergus and Norman drove with **Bob Kelly '54**, another brother, to Miami in Fergus' new 1952 Chevrolet. Norman vividly remembers visiting Sloppy Joe's and flying to Havana, Cuba on Q Airlines for the unbelievable price of just \$10 a person

The duo kept in touch after graduation as well. Norman said that they once rented two Pennsylvania railroad club cars to travel to Philadelphia for the Army-Navy game, which was a very big deal at that time. "He was very gregarious, and always invited old and new

friends to his home and other events," Norman said of his friend.

The two even agreed to be the best man at each other's weddings, and proudly fulfilled that promise when the time came. Although their first marriages both ended in divorce, they were both there for each other's second weddings, and every big occasion in between.

But Fergus was not only there for Norman during the high points in his life, he was also there for the low.

In February of 1966, after he had just gone through a divorce and moved to a new apartment, Norman resigned from his job at Merrill Lynch in New York City. Thankfully, Fergus was there to offer him a position at Orvis Brothers & Company where he was working as a partner in charge of sales. "Fergus came to my rescue many times," he said of their friendship.

Sadly, Fergus passed away on November 8, 2015, just a few months before his 83<sup>rd</sup> birthday. Norman said that, as time goes on, it is always difficult to hear that a brother has passed away, but some say that we began to die on the day we were born, so we must seize every moment.

Sigma Chi helped Norman form many lifelong friendships and seize every moment that he and Fergus had together. He says, "I thank Sigma Chi for not only giving me a brother, but many, many more brothers."

Pledge Class Celebrates 25-Year Reunion in May

"Sigma Chi is about bringing honor to people, and remembering the impact they've made in their lifetime. We're all going to die, so it's important that we remember each other. We need to do that at all times, not just when we die. The opportunity to honor the living and the deceased brings honor to who we are."

The class of '91 has preserved their friendships for all these years, and they all embraced Sigma Chi and what it represents, which is a practice that has certainly paid off.

"Something like Sigma Chi benefits you for your whole life," said Greenawalt. "But you have to make an effort to contribute. It has to be important to you because it keeps you rooted and signifies what's important. My family and I frequently visit UPenn for Homecoming, reunions, and football games.


