Consul Griffin Rubin '17 gave a brief overview of the State of the Chapter. There are currently 54 active members and 7 fall pledges preparing for initiation. The fall pledge program accommodates spring varsity athletic schedules. The chapter was honored last summer at the Huntsman Cancer Institute for achieving the \$20,000 Club level of donor support. Eight members of the chapter recently participated in the annual fall leadership retreat led by Jon Greenawalt, Sr. '61. Elections for officers will take place in December to begin terms in Jan 2017.

Vice President and Treasurer Jerry Knorr '82 provided a financial report that summarized the Alumni House Corp's following fund balances:

Highlights include: Over the past year our unrestricted managed assets grew about 10% from \$96k to \$106k and our capital improvement assets continue to hold a strong position at \$115k. Engaging young alumni into the annual dues campaign remains a challenge.

Board President Mark Kocent '82 gave an overview of the recently completed capital projects since the last meeting. Since we have attained a high quality of improvements over the past years, we only required a minimal investment of about \$10k in finishes, painting, carpet cleaning and bathroom upgrades this year. These expenditures were covered by the central pooled OFSL fund.

The following projects are under consideration for the pooled fund for the next two fiscal years.

Front Steps Repair ~ \$32,000 Pooled Fund - summer 2017 New Electric Distribution and Subpanels

~ \$100-150,000 Pooled Fund - summer 2018

HISTORY ON THE HARDWOOD

Penn's Famed Palestra Now 90 Years Young

On New Year's Day, one of the most famous athletic arenas in the country will turn 90 years old. As luck would have it, that building sits on the University of Pennsylvania campus.

The Palestra first opened for business on Jan. 1, 1927. The Penn men's basketball team pulled off a 26-15 victory over Yale that day in front of 10,000 fans. Ninety years later, the Palestra is the most famous collegiate

basketball arena in the world. It has hosted 52 NCAA basketball tournament games, more than any other venue. It is home not only to Penn's teams, but also the famed Big 5 basketball series.

Since the Palestra opened, the Quakers men's basketball team has won or shared 25 Ivy League championships. The women's team has captured four league crowns, most recently last year.

Penn's wrestling team and women's volleyball squad also call the Palestra home. And the arena has hosted high school and professional games over the years. For a time, the Philadelphia 76ers played occasionally at the Palestra. In 2011, a group of NBA stars



played an exhibition there before 8,000 fans during the NBA lockout.

But the Palestra has always been first and foremost about the college game: It's been called the "Cathedral of College Basketball." In 1998, Roy Williams brought his University of Kansas squad to West Philadelphia to play Penn because the Jayhawks' radio play-by-play man, Bob Davis, wanted to call a game there.

On Jan. 7, a Big Ten school will play host at the famed building as Penn State meets Michigan State. Long-time Spartans coach Tom Izzo will finally get to coach a game at the Palestra.

"They all tell me I've got to get to the Palestra," Izzo said during a press conference in 2014. "One of these years, I'm gonna be dumb enough to do it."

Charles Klauder, the architect who brought the building to life on South 33rd Street, probably had no idea that his arena would become a mecca for hoop heads. But that's what it is today: Mention the Palestra to most any college basketball fan, and just watch the smile of recognition. As former Penn coach and current

Temple coach Fran Dunphy put it, "When it's filled, and it's a crazy atmosphere, it's kind of indescribable. I don't think you can ever pinpoint in words what it's like. I think people have to experience it."

Do you remember going to games at the Palestra? Were you there during that magical 1978-79 season when the Quakers advanced to the Final Four? Or perhaps you were a student during Dunphy's glory years in the mid-90s, when Penn won or shared four straight Ivy League championships?
